BRAWL Community Coordinator Quarterly Report

This quarterly report refers to the last quarter, from **August to October 2024.** There were **3** Monday working bees, 1 weekend working bee with ANU students and 1 executive meeting. There have been 3 contractor day (in addition to working bees) between sites 5 and 1, and 1 contractor day along the racecourse.

East Street weed control & revegetation

In June 2024, Council undertook weed control works along the East Street revegetation area targeting broad-leaf and small-leaf Privet (Ligustrum lucidum and L. sinense), Blackberry (Rubus fruticosus), and Box Elder (Acer negundo). Target weeds were mulched in-situ leaving thin mulch layer across the surface.

Council is running two tree planting events to revegetate the area with 1500 locally native species. On Friday 25th October, seven school groups will attend the river to planting seedlings. On Saturday 26th October, there will be a community tree planting event form 10-12.30pm meeting opposite Millowine St. The Lions Club will provide a BBQ from 11.30-12.30pm. See flyer below. This revegetation effort will go a long way to improving the habitat quality of the rehabilitation area and to help manage invasive weeds. Please come along to the community event, it would be great to have a strong BRAWL presence at the event.



LLS Racecourse funding:

LLS awarded BRAWL a \$6,000 grant in 2022 for weed control works along the Racecourse and Anabranch Track and East Street. There is \$2,654.40 remaining of this grant. Dave Klotz undertook this a sweep of the Racecourse in September 2024. Dave noted that the weeds were quite good in this area given the past work in this area to control the weeds. We will continue to undertake one sweep of the area each Spring until the funds are expended.

The original LLS funding is for the red and yellow polygons.



Platypus Corner




Participation Summary

Numbers at working bees are consistent with past trends, ranging from 9 to 17 volunteers. Two working bees were rescheduled during the quarter due to strong winds and a public holiday. This usually results in reduced attendance by volunteers, but only for the September event. In the last quarter, 31 different volunteers have attended working bees (this includes 10 ANU students).

In this time there was a total of 139 volunteer hours at working bees, 161.5 hours of additional volunteer participation, 0 school hours, 0 hours training, 24 in-kind hours and \$679 in-kind costs (donated plants and guards).



Date	Site	Activity	No. Plantings	Follow-up Comments
Aug 2024	Site 3 & 2	Hemlock, privet, bamboo, turkey & chickweed. Tending plantings (Site 2 - December 2023) planting.	0	 Check Site 2 for bamboo seedlings. There have been 5 seedlings emerged in the last year. Jens dug out one and noted its large root mat with lateral roots extending. Jens sprayed privet seedings in Site 4 & 4b. Stakes with pink paint tips mark turkey rhubarb sprayed last December by Paddy and Premjyoti.
Aug 2024	Junction crossing	ANU student visit Weed control – primarily hemlock, small privet seedlings and chickweed. Talk about BRAWL history and rehabilitation challenges.	0	 Weeded around plantings. Cut down privet branches and filled 4WD tracks to discourage use (note that they were all pulled out within days of being placed). Two bollards above the riverside vehicle tracks have been pulled out and are missing, but no other major damage observed. Paddy and Premjyoti followed up with watering plantings in the days following the event.
Sept 2024	Site 1	Tree Planting	160 (BRAWL) 40 (Paddy donated)	 Donated 40 plants and 100 guards – Paddy notes greater success with the shorter carboard guards as they are less likely to collapse in on the plants. Trad raked off the plantings – hoping fungal smut will slow its growth back over the plantings. Plants watered in & watered plants at River Crossing site.
October 2023	Site 5 & 4	Weed maintenance + spraying around plants.	0	 Weeds targeted on raised flat of site 5, targeting hemlock, turkey rhubarb and blackberry. Keep an eye on blackberry. Evidence of Chinese boxthorn regrowth. Smaller plants were pulled and deeperrooted plants were sprayed. Keep an eye on reinfestation. Lots of planting loss, however, those that have survived are tall and healthy. These indicate capacity to fill most gaps. Privet showing signs of dieback following recent contractor sprays. Follow-up: Periwinkle starting to get a stronghold – approach is to spray a containment line around infestation and work inwards over time use of large amounts of chemicals and risk of large bare patch. Privet closer to river channel targeted for spraying by Jens following working bee.
